

#### Newsletter One July 2009

Welcome to our first newsletter which is letting you know how the Isle of Wight is getting on with the Aiming High programme.

### Just to remind you of the background.

- All Councils and Primary Care Trusts in England have been asked by the Government to improve their short break services for disabled children particularly those with severe and complex needs over the next two years.
- Councils and PCTs must to be able to show they meet the "Full Service Offer" (FSO) by March 2011 (Further information about the FSO can be found on the last page)
- A ring fenced grant is available to councils for short break services this year, on the Isle of Wight, there is £146,000 which can be spent on services and £71,000 capital which can be spend on buildings and equipment.
- The PCT is jointly working with the children's trust to significantly increase the range of services locally focussing on palliative care and access to equipment.
- The grant should be used to enable children and young people to access "ordinary" activities which are fun and enjoyable

• A "short break" could therefore be taking part in an after school activity, pursuing a leisure pastime or attending a holiday scheme, and would not always involve an overnight stay away from home.

• Following a workshop and other consultation processes an "Aiming High" plan has been drawn up for 2009/10 (see back page).

• Discussions are underway about plans for 2010/11. It's important that parents and children "have their say" about what they want to happen! This started at the second Aiming High workshop held on 1st July.

(held in February) Parents were clear that more short breaks were needed and wanted more choice e.g. Holiday Schemes and personal assistants.

# Parents Voice – **Promoting Parents Views** What is Parents Voice?

Parents Voice is a group of parents/carers who meet to discuss real issues that affect children with disabilities and Special educational needs on the Isle of Wight. Our purpose is to help shape change to existing services and to participate in the planning of new and future initiatives for children. As parents have the experience of being at the receiving end of many of these services it makes sense for us to be involved in the design of them too.

## What we do

The group meet half termly with officers from children's services to discuss and explore issues and mutual areas of concern relating to children and young people with disabilities and learning difficulties. Parents members have the opportunity to ask questions, share their views and gain a better understanding of processes on the Isle of Wight as well as maintaining and raising awareness of the views of parents . Through the Aiming High Parent Participation Fund we have been allocated funding to help more parents/carers have a say in planning and shaping services for children with disabilities/special educational needs. We are developing our own website where parents can give their views to us and planning workshops to get more parents involved.

The Isle of Wight branch of the National Autistic Society was launched in June 2008 by a group of parents. We aim to give par-

ents and carers support by meeting reqularly and by offering seminars and workshops. Services include an online support group; provision of information on autism. We are here to support anyone who may be affected by autism, Asperger syndrome or any Autistic Spectrum Disorder. We offer informal, friendly support and can direct families to more structured help. The NAS Isle of Wight branch currently offers:

- Autism friendly screenings at Cineworld on the last Sunday of every month at 10.30am, tickets only cost £1 per person.
- NAS family sport & social group this started 5th January 2009. The children have so far experienced Yoga Bugs with Louise Morgan, Martial Arts with Simon Lailey, Trampolining with Ian Morgan of Wight Flyers. Older children now have the opportunity to use the Climbing Wall and younger children can use the Mini Gym & Multi Skills play equipment at Medina Leisure Centre.

# What is Family Link?

The Family Link Scheme supports disabled children aged 3 – 18, and their families on the Isle of Wight. We aim to place disabled children with "link families" to offer a short break from a few hours to a couple of nights every month.

The Family Link Scheme enables families to:

• Have a rest; Do the weekly shop; Spend time with other children in the family;

• Have an evening out; Pursue a hobby Most importantly it means the disabled child has a positive new experience!

# Could you do it?

We are looking for people who would like to help with the care of a disabled child. Experience of looking after children is helpful but not essential. We're not looking for experts or any one type of person, but people that have a genuine interest in children. Most importantly you need to be able to offer a consistent and stable household and a fun placement.

We will attempt to match you with the right child. We'll talk to you about this before making any placement so that you and the family are happy.

- Carers will receive ongoing support and training.
- Applicants undergo an assessment, which includes health and safety checks on the home and pets, Criminal Records Bureau check and references.
- Expenses will be met with a small allowance to cover the additional cost of looking after an extra child.
- Additional equipment will be supplied if required

#### What is the "full service offer"?

It's a statement of the standards for short breaks services that all Children's Trusts are meant to reach by March 2011. Services should:

- Be based on a needs assessment and led by consultation and feedback
- Offer a greater volume of short breaks when measured against 2008/9
- Use fair, understandable and transparent eligibility criteria
- Offer a wide range of provision that is planned and regular
- Be fit for purpose and age appropriate
- Be a positive experience for the child or young person
- Provide for children and Young Person with ASD who also have severe learning difficulties or challenging behaviour and those with complex health needs
- Provide value for money in terms of quality of care/outcomes delivered
