The Government wants to

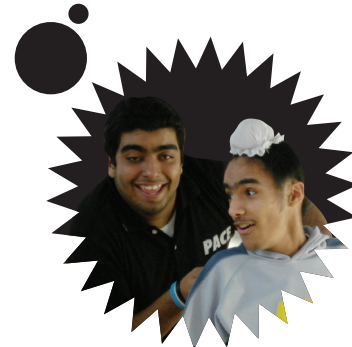
1. make sure that what you need is seen as the most important thing

## Why are these changes happening?

Disabled children and their families told the Government they wanted

- more fun things for young people to do
- more support for young people as they grow up



## What this means for you

The Government listened to what they were told. Over the next few years there will be a lot more money for services that you and your family need.

Some of the money will be used for

- more chances for you to do new things and make friends
- more support for you as you get older and leave school
- making childcare work better for you and your family
