Decision reference	102/10

Agenda item	Public Question Time
Decision reference	104/10
Questions	A written question had been submitted by Miss Becky Coleman of Cowes (PQ15/10) with regard to the council's responsibilities with regard to the resurfacing of outside tennis courts for use by wheelchair players, and subsequent conversion into a

covered court.
The Cabinet Member responded by advising that the council had recently provided funds to Ventnor Tennis club in support of its application for grants from Sport England and that the courts are, as a result of funding, accessible for wheelchair use and of an appropriate specification as outlined by the Lawn Tennis Association (LTA) for wheelchair tennis. It was also noted that the courts owned and operated by Ryde Mead and Ryde Lawn Tennis clubs meet the required standards for wheelchair tennis.
The council however had no current plans to develop an indoor tennis facility, although it is in contact with the LTA about such a possibility. It was however possible to play tennis indoors at Medina Leisure Centre or Ryde High School Sports Centre.
A written question had been submitted by Mrs Susan Coleman of Cowes (PQ16/10) with regard to whether there will be gym/tone zone equipment specifically accessible to disabled wheelchair users.
The Cabinet Member responded by stating that the health and fitness facilities at Waterside, Medina Leisure Centre and The Heights Leisure Centre would all meet the accessibility standards as set out in Sport England's Inclusive Fitness Initiative (IFI). The equipment provided would therefore be accessible to wheelchair users and would also include rowing machines.

Agenda item	Amendment to the Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order 2008– (Paper B)
Decision reference	105/10
Summary of discussion	The Cabinet was presented with a report which sought the approval to put in place a revised Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order which would have revised dog exclusion zones on beaches and other areas across the Island. The Cabinet Member for Fire and Community Safety advised members that the decision was originally due to be taken via delegated powers. However following various meetings with relevant ward members in Ryde as well as taking on board the views of Ryde Town Council and also the residents of Ryde, it was decided to not concur with the officer recommendation within the report which applied to Ryde. It was therefore decided to take the item to the Cabinet for final decision
	An amended recommendation to the report was moved which

	agreed with all the orders proposed with the exception of Ryde East beach. The amendment took on board all the wishes of Ryde residents, Elected Members and Ryde Town Council
	Members were advised that to adopt the amendment would mean that all of Ryde's beaches would not attain the Blue Flag status. However, the overall wishes of residents had been taken into account.
	The Cabinet Member for Economy, Tourism, Leisure and Planning stated that whist attaining Blue Flag was no longer achievable in the short term; it was still the council's desire to see such status in the long term future.
	A revised map and signs for Ryde East explaining the zones would be issued in due course.
Issues Raised by Other Members	Cllr Wayne Whittle, the Ward Member for Ryde North East, thanked the Cabinet Member for his sympathetic response to Ryde's requests. Cllr Whittle was also of the opinion that the nature of the beach in Ryde where the tide would retreat a very long distance was a major attraction for dog walkers and to have the facility to walk dogs on the wet sand could also be seen as a benefit to tourists who visit the Island with their pets.
	Cllr Julie Jones Evans asked about the economic impact of not attaining the blue flag status.
	The Cabinet Member for Economy, Tourism, Leisure and Planning responded by stating that whilst attaining the status was desirable, there were no official figures to support any economic impact of not having the award.
Decision taken	THAT the revised Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order as outlined in Appendix 1, but with no amendments relating to the beach ban on Ryde East is adopted and approved.
Reason for decision and corporate themes it aligns with	To contribute to the Safe and Well Kept Island theme of the Eco-Island Sustainable Community Strategy, the Strategic Programme and the Corporate Plan through an integrated approach to monitoring and maintaining dog exclusion areas on the Isle of Wight.

	Option 2. To Approve an amendment to The Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order 2008 as outlined in Appendix 1.
	Option 3. To adopt and approve the revised Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order as outlined in Appendix 1, but with the amendments relating to the beach ban in Ryde. These amendments keep the 100 metre boundary and add an additional beach entry/exit point within the beach ban area to the east of the harbour beach.
	Option 4 - To adopt and approve the revised Dogs Control Exclusion (Isle of Wight) Order as outlined in Appendix 1, but with no dog exclusion zone in Ryde.

Agenda item	Youth Reorganisation Proposals
Decision reference	106/10
Summary of Discussion	The Cabinet was presented with a report which provided a summary of the background information, and the consultation work undertaken to date in connection with the proposal to reorganise Youth Provision on the Isle of Wight.
	The Leader and Cabinet Member for Governance and School Improvement emphasised that future youth provision should focus upon opportunities for young people to undertake positive activities with trained and experienced adults rather than relying upon providing just premises.
	It was also noted that support provided should not only be limited to youth activities but also to such initiatives as the Student Rider scheme which enabled young people to travel around the Island at an affordable rate.
	The Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Adult Social Care, Public Health and Housing stated that a wide range of consultation had resulted in positive feedback from service users which would enable the council to put together the right outcome.
	The relevant Cabinet Members moved that an amendment be

	put forward to the to original report which would allow for a paper to be brought back to Cabinet following final consultation to agree an implementation plan to take effect from September 2010.
Issues Raised by Other Members	Cllr Julie Jones Evans requested that the proposed new fire station in Newport could be linked in with Youth Provision Services as a community area where the level of engagement between young and respected adult figures could be achieved. The Leader responded by stating that this would be included in the next stage of the plan.
	Cllr George Cameron reiterated that the proposals were what the Islands youth required. Cllr Cameron was also thanked for his work as Chairman on the previous Policy Commission for Children and School Results which initiated the proposals.
	Cllr Geoff Lumley stated that the Pan Youth Centre which was run by the local community on a voluntary basis was very successfully attended and requested that any financial assistance from the council would be very gratefully received.
	The Leader responded by stating that officers had already been in touch with the Pan Centre and it was acknowledged as a fine example. Young people's views had been listened to and whist the centre was located at the local school, it was not seen by users as a school like environment.
	The Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Adult Social Care, Public Health and Housing also highlighted the Isabelle Centre and Brading Youth Centre as exemplar cases where service users had spoken highly of them.
Decision taken	THAT the principles for reorganisation as stated in paragraphs $3 - 9$ of the Cabinet report be agreed.
	THAT the Cabinet Member for Governance and School Improvement, the Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Social Care, Public Health and Housing and the Director for Children and Young People be delegated to undertake a detailed consultation (though in adherence to the Local Government Acts 1986 and 1988 Government code of recommended practice on Local Authority publicity during elections)
	THAT, following the final consultation, a paper is brought back to the Cabinet to agree an implementation plan to take effect from September 2010.

Options considered and rejected	Option A - To agree the principles for reorganisation stated in paragraphs $3 - 9$ (of this paper) and to delegate to the Lead Member and Director for Children and Young People a final consultation (though in adherence to the Local Government Acts 1986 and 1988 Government code of recommended practice on Local Authority publicity during elections) and subsequent decision-making responsibility related to implementation of a reorganisation plan to take effect from September 2010.

Agenda item	Delivering Better Services – Service Re-Design
Decision reference	107/10
Summary of Discussion	The Cabinet was presented with a report which set out how the transformation savings identified in Appendix 4 of the Budget for 2010-13 would be achieved and was in response to the commitment made at Full Council on 24 February 2010.
	The Cabinet Member highlighted that the savings of £12 million as outlined within the Transformation programme as approved by Cabinet on Tuesday, 17 November 2009 over the coming three years would be delivered by changes to the way the council works. This would be achieved by £8 million internally and £4 million externally. The total of £1.47million would be delivered throughout the course of the 2010.
	With regard to the Learning and Disability Review (identified as the Westminster House proposal), a working group chaired by the Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Social Care, Public Health and Housing and including service users and representatives from external partners had been established to look at the current spend of approximately £11 million. The group would review the whole-life needs of Learning Disability clients and would also include a detailed consideration of the services currently provided at Westminster House. Following an implementation period, a work programme would then be set up to assist in delivering the required savings. The Working Group's proposals, once developed, would then be reported back to Cabinet at a future date to be identified.
	With regard to savings within the Children and Young People directorate, non-recurrent savings had been identified to meet the £618,000 target.
Issues Raised by Other Members	In relation to the Review of Street Based Services, Cllr Julie Jones Evans highlighted the good work of the Newport Environment and Neighbourhood Officers (ENOs).
	Cllr Geoff Lumley highlighted the area around Learning and Disability Review (Westminster House) and requested clarification as to the implication of paragraph 17 of the Cabinet report. Cllr Lumley stated that the paper did not make clear the future of Westminster House.
	Both the Leader and the Cabinet Member reiterated the budget recommendation on how the Transformation paper would assist in delivering savings. The council was looking at all

	areas in order to determine the future of Westminster House and would continue to speak to service users and staff. However, to offer a guarantee in relation to the facility was considered as inappropriate prior to the Working Group developing its proposals.
Decision taken	THAT the service redesign projects as identified within the Cabinet report against the proposed scope and savings be approved.
	THAT it be noted a further report be brought back to a future Cabinet on the proposals for achieving savings in Learning Disability services for decision once the working group has completed.

Agenda item	Implementation of the Leisure Facilities Improvement Plan
Decision reference	108/10
Summary of Discussion	Cabinet was presented with a progress to date in respect of the implementation of the Cabinet decision of 20 January 2009 to complete the outline design works and confirm the capital costs of improving the Council's leisure facilities.
	Members were advised that the cost to bring all of the leisure buildings on the Island to an "as built" condition was estimated to be £17.3million with a contingent increase in net revenue cost of £211,000 per year in order to continue to maintain at this level. This was not considered to be achievable and as a result further works were agreed to be undertaken to develop a

	pragmatic improvement programme to refurbish and replace the critical elements and extend the range of income earning activities in the existing facilities. The cost of this approach was estimated at £8million.
	The Cabinet Member for Fire and Community Safety stated that the proposals within the report were welcome and long overdue and that the council's duty to meet Equality and Diversity needs would be also be addressed as a result of providing facilities for all, irrespective of ability.
Issues Raised by Other Members	Cllr Susan Scoccia advised that Ventnor Tennis club was accessible to wheelchair users and the Rew Valley Sports Centre in Ventnor also offered full size indoor tennis facilities which would be accessible to wheelchair users. The centre was also able to offer a variety of other sports facilities.
Decision taken	THAT tenders be sought for the undertaking all of the improvements to the leisure facilities as outlined in Appendix 2 of the report, the detailed schedule of improvement works.
	THAT the Council's contribution to the capital cost of the improved works be a maximum of £8m, as previously agreed and included in the medium term financial plan.
	THAT the Cabinet Member for Economy, Tourism, Leisure and Planning and the Director of Economy and Environment agree any required changes to the improvement works to ensure that they are completed within the capital budget made available by the Council.
	THAT the completion of the improvement works in accordance with the proposed project programme as outlined in Appendix 3 of the report be agreed.
