

CAMHS Mapping: Isle of Wight

NB: this data comprises details of young people seen by specialist mental health staff, located mainly but not exclusively in the Isle of Wight PCT Specialist CAMHS Service.

Isle of Wight Specialist CAMHS - Number of Cases

- A case is a young person, or a young person and their family, with whom CAMHS staff have been actively working.
- The caseload is a count of active cases with whom CAMHS staff have worked in the sample period.




Comment: it is not clear why the caseload and number of new cases increased in 2007-08 but it is possible that this reflects a local recording issue.


Isle of Wight Specialist CAMHS - Primary Presenting Problem





Specialist CAMHS: Primary Presenting Problems as a % of Total

COMMENTARY

Background

The National Service Framework for Children, Young People and Maternity Services establishes standards for promoting the health and well-being of children and young people. It incorporates 11 standards including Standard 9, "The Mental Health and Psychological Well-being of Children and Young People", which states:

"All children and young people, from birth to their eighteenth birthday, who have mental health problems and disorders have access to timely, integrated, high quality, multi-disciplinary mental health services to ensure effective assessment, treatment and support, for them and their families."

The term CAMHS (Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services) describes mental health services for young people. According to the NSF, the term is used in two different ways.

- As a broad concept embracing all services that contribute to the mental health care of children and young people, whether provided by health, education, social services or other agencies.
- Specialist CAMHS delivered by specialist staff for young people with more severe, complex or persistent disorders - **addressed in this dataset**.

Most young people who receive services from specialist CAMHS will do so through attendance for out-patient appointments. A small proportion will require in-patient residential treatment, sometimes at specialist units or from specialist teams for conditions such as eating disorders.

CAMHS Mapping is an annual data collection and reporting system which creates an annual snapshot of local service provision and investment, and provides trend data as annual data accumulates. The data and charts, **top**, show IW data compared with England for the period 2006-07 - 2008-09 (provisional data). (Data for years before this period is not believed to be consistent with that from the more recent years). Key points include:

- The total caseload and number of new cases increased significantly in 2007-08 but fell again in 2008-09. It is not clear why this was and it is possible that it reflects an inconsistency in local data collection and recording for the mapping exercise.
- In 2008-09, compared with England and South Central Strategic Health Authority, the IW had a similar caseload rate (number of cases per 1000 population aged 0 - 17). The IW rate was higher than both in 2007-08 but based on the higher number of cases mentioned above.
- Among the IW caseload, in each year shown, Emotional Disorders / Problems comprise the largest single group of primary presenting problems - over 1/3 in each year.
- The IW % breakdown of primary presenting problems in 2008-09 is similar to that in England and South Central SHA, where emotional disorders also comprise the largest single group of presenting problems. The IW has slightly higher percentages of deliberate self-harm, and of habit and autistic spectrum disorders.

Specialist in-Patient Treatments

The data and charts, below, show data about IW young people who have received specialist residential placements for treatment for mental health problems for the period 2004-05 - 2008-09. Key points include:

- 28 young people received specialist in-patient treatments over this period, all off the Island.
- In terms of placements each year, there were 60 placements supported over this period, or an average of 15 each year. (This figure of 60 counts each young person in each year in which they were placed).
- Over this 5 year period, 43% of young people were placed for 1 year or less; 32% for 1 - 2 years; and 25% for 2 - 5 years.

Significance for Health	Higher rates could indicate worse health or better uptake of services. Lower rates could indicate better health or poorer access to services.
Factors that might affect the Accuracy of this Indicator	Data is entered by each CAMHS service commissioning organisation (in this case Isle of Wight PCT) on to a national online data collection and reporting system. The data's accuracy, consistency over time and consistency between areas depends on the quality and consistency of local data recording, collation and entry.
