



### Cowes Ward Cluster; Age and Gender as % of population (25795), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009





This cluster shows a similar profile to the Island as a whole:

Late teens leave the area in search of education, employment and accommodation, leading to low levels of children (compared to national figures). However, this area shows evidence of the presence of a number of young families, with slightly above Island profile proportions of both the 35-44 age band and children (0-14).


Inward migration in the age-band 35 to 50 increase both those age groups and the proportion of their teenage offspring.

Proportionally inward migration continues across the age-bands 50 to 70 to give a significantly higher proportion of retirees.


This ward contains proportionally high numbers of adults under 50 and is accompanied by high numbers of young children in particular, as well as significant numbers of teenagers. This indicates this area contains many (possibly larger) families with children of all ages.


There is little sign of an out-migration of late teens, as is common across most of the Island, although this may be due to in-migration of young families replacing those leaving rather than out-migration of this group not occurring.

Out-migration begins around age 50+, indicating few people choose to retire in this location.



### Cowes North Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (3237), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009







Much like Cowes Medina, but to a lesser extent, this ward is unusual in that unlike most other areas there is inmigration from the 20-24 age band. This continues until around 45, when out-migration starts to occur. The ward also contains a higher than Island profile amount of very young children, which is expected given the high proportion of adults of these ages (20 to 45).

This indicates that many young families are based, or move into this area, possibly for employment, accommodation or access to facilities such as schools. The fall in numbers after 45 indicates that this is not an area that many people choose to retire in.



## Cowes South and Northwood Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (3898), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009







The ward contain large numbers of families with children, as numbers of children are higher than the Island profile. This is supported by the proportionally high number of those aged between 35 and 59.

The ward experiences a significant out-migration of late teens, but in-migration occurs from around 35, possibly with families moving into this area for employment, accommodation and access to facilities such as schools.



## Cowes West and Gurnard Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (3550), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009






The population of this ward is marked by a high proportion of retired people, including presumably those who have moved here to retire. There is a particularly high proportion of 85+ females and the 60-64 age band contributes over 10% of the local population.


There is net outward migration amongst young adults from age 20 onwards, a trend which starts to reverse amongst the 30 plus age group.

Inwards migration at these ages (35 to 50) tends to feature teenage families, and there is some evidence of this occurring.



## East Cowes Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (3971), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009






The ward contains proportionally high numbers of young children (under 10), together these age bands contribute over 11% of the local population.

The 60-64 age group is larger than the Island profile, but there is a significant outmigration after this age (65+) indicating many people choose to retire in an alternative location. However, the 80+ age band is close to the Island profile, possibly indicating strong local roots.




This ward contains higher than the Island profile proportion of under 20's, with the 15-19 age group contributing over 7% of the local population. The ward also contains proportionally high numbers of females in the 40-44 age group, indicating that this area may contain a high number of lone parent households.



However, this ward contains a similar to Island profile proportion of children, indicating the presence of a number of larger families.

There is a significant in-migration around 60+, indicating a number of people chose to retire in this ward.
