
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




The profile for this cluster follows many of the same trends identified for the Island as a whole. This includes the migration away from the area evidenced from age 20, in the pursuit of education, employment and/or accommodation, which helps explain the lower than Island profile numbers of children.

Population grows from around age 35-39, and expands further due to high numbers of retirees from age 55 (with over 10% of the population being in the 60-64 age band).






This ward shows in-migration from 40+ until around 65, where significant out-migration occurs. This indicates that despite the 60-64 age band being the largest (almost 10% of the population) people do not tend to retire in this area.

The high proportion in the 40 - 59 age band helps explain the Island profile numbers of older children and teenagers.






This ward has a significant 60+ population, with the 60-64 age band contributing over 10% of the population (with the female population in this age band considerably higher than the male). There is an out-migration of late teens in search of education, employment and accommodation, as is familiar across most of the Island.

In-migration starts to occur from around age 35, which helps explain the near Island profile numbers of 5-9 age band children.






This ward includes large numbers of pre and post retirement aged people; with a large cohort of 50-75. However, there are also higher than the Island profile numbers of teenagers (15-19), likely to be attached to the significant 40-50 age group.

All other age groups below 40 are under represented compared with the Island profile, with a noticeable out migration of the 20 to 30 age groups.

In this ward there is a fair degree of conformance to the Island profile:

The numbers of the 20-24 age band exceed the Island profile for both females and males, which helps explain the close to Island profile numbers of very young children (under 5).

There is in-migration to the ward for retirement from the age of 55 to 65, the profile for the post 65 age groups approximates the Island profile, while the 60-64 age band contributes over 10% of the population.



This ward has a predominance of pre and post retirement aged people (higher than the Island profile); with a large cohort of 85+ females while around 11% of the population are in the 60-64 age band and over 8% in the 65-69 age band.

Age groups below 50 are under represented compared with the Island profile, with a noticeable out migration of the 20 to 30 age groups, and a consequent shortfall in the numbers of very young children.
