


West Wight Cluster; Age and Gender as % of population (15506), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009





This cluster of wards has a predominance of pre and post retirement aged people; with a large cohort of the 85+ age group, in particular females.

Age groups below 50 are under represented compared with the Island profile, with a noticeable out migration of the 20 to 30 age groups, and a consequent shortfall in the numbers of very young children.

There is a sustained over representation of the pre and post retirement age population (from age 55 onwards) in this area in proportion to the Island profile.


Young adults leave the ward at age 20, for education and or employment, consequentially the under 10, and in particular under 5 population is low.

There is an influx of people in their early-to-mid thirties that continues across the age groups to the mid-forties, some numbers of these that move into the area do so with teenage children.





There are disproportionally high levels of the 60 plus population; the 60 to 64 age groups comprises 10% of the overall population.

The young adult to early middle age are proportionally fewer in number despite which the school age population is close to the Island profile, suggesting that average family size is larger in this ward.



Freshwater South Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (2941), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009






The population of this ward is marked by a high proportion of retired people and those presumably whom have moved here to retire.

There is net outward migration amongst young adults from age 20 onwards, a trend which starts to reverse amongst the 30 plus age group.

Inwards migration at these ages (35 to 50) tends to feature teenage families, and there is some evidence of this occurring.



Totland Ward; Age and Gender as % of population (2981), Compared to the Isle of Wight: ONS Mid Year Estimates 2009





This ward is distinguished by the number of elderly females, in the 85+ age group there are around three times the number of 85+ females to 85+ males, overall there are significantly more people in the age groups 55+ than is the case for the Island as a whole.

The under 55 males broadly follow the Island profiles albeit at somewhat lower percentages. Females in particular appear to leave the area at age 18 to 24 for employment or education, although numbers of young children (under 10) are close to the Island profile.

Young adults leave this ward at around age 20 to pursue education and/or employment, this has an impact on the number of under 10 children in the area.


Typically in the more rural areas there is an influx of people at about age 35, many of these will be buying 2nd and 3rd homes perhaps with an eye to ultimately retiring in the area. This group will have families containing larger numbers of teenage children.

The area is attracting larger than the Island proportion of the 'baby boomers' and many of these families will be reducing in size as their young adult children are leaving.
