The Control of Major Accident Hazard Regulations 1999 (COMAH)

The COMAH Regulations came into force on the 1 April 1999 and replace the previous Control of Industrial Major Accident Hazards (CIMAH) Regulations.

COMAH Regulations apply mostly to the chemical industry, but are also applied to some storage activities (explosives and nuclear sites), and other industries where threshold quantities of dangerous substances, as identified in the Regulations, are kept or used.

The Health and Safety Executive and the Environment Agency are responsible for the enforcement of the COMAH Regulations. These authorities are known as the 'Competent Authority'.

There are two classifications under the Regulations:

Upper Tier Sites Lower Tier Sites

Upper Tier Sites have an off-site plan which is prepared by the Local Authority and tested every three years. We currently have no Upper Tier Sites on the Island.

Lower Tier Sites have a duty to prepare and hold a Major Accident Prevention Policy otherwise known as a MAPP.
