Business Link is the primary access channel for all business support in the South East.

- Free Business Health Check which offers advice on cash-flow, marketing and business planning, debt management and product development.
- Access to finance advice, credit crunch presentations and finance seminars.
- Guidance on how to survive in difficult times.
- Specialist skills assessment and access to Train to Gain to increase the skills of your workforce. A team of skills brokers provide quality assured impartial advice to help businesses identify skills needs and source high quality vocational skills training, such as Apprenticeships and leadership and management opportunities.
- Information on new business opportunities and markets.
- Financing is available via Enterprise Finance Guarantee Scheme and freeing up bank lending.

- Grant for Business Investment.
 Funding is available for those companies whose capital investment plans are being held up by the current economic conditions.
- Immerse programme providing extensive design support to selected larger businesses who are looking for robust business development opportunities.
- Manufacturing Advisory Service.
- Transition Loan Fund. Directed at those fully established viable businesses who are currently facing difficulties in obtaining credit through banks.
- Commercialisation Fund. Available for companies with high growth potential to bring new services into the market.

SEEDA is responsible for funding and delivering Business Link in the South East.

What are the roles and responsibilities of the key partners?

Keeping the South East Working is a co-ordinated approach to ensure businesses and individuals have access to business, employment and skills advice and practical assistance.

The aim is to help employers continue trading through the downturn, but where this is not possible, to provide the support and advice to prepare people to work with other employers.

This is a priority in the region. Jobcentre Plus, the Learning and Skills Council and SEEDA, supported by the Government Office for the South East, are working to deliver the plan by working in regional and local partnerships, (which will critically include local authorities and local networks) with a focus on:

 Supporting businesses through a package of measures aimed at improving business viability and assisting with specific issues.

- Providing a rapid response for those at threat of, or experiencing, redundancy.
- Enhancing adult information, advice and guidance so that individuals, especially those made redundant, have tailored advice and signposting to relevant training or employment and other necessary services.
- Providing employment advice and skills opportunities including for those who are unemployed or at risk of redundancy, through both pre-employment and vocational training.
- Supporting young people as they prepare for employment and training or face redundancy.

Individuals and businesses will benefit from clear signposting to the skills, business and employment support available to them for workforce development, re-training, benefits and financial support and finding new jobs.



- Provides information, advice and support to start, maintain and grow businesses.
- Helps businesses to understand their needs and refers them to the most appropriate support from the public, private and voluntary sectors.
