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

Schools' reorganisation odate...

At the time of *One Island* going to press, a decision on which of the three options for schools' reorganisation to take forward, had not vet been made.

But news of a decision on the way ahead, will have been published in the local media.

During the consultation process, which ended on 22 February, the council held ten well-attended public meetings and also received many emails and letters about the reorganisation proposals.

More than 3,000 questionnaires were sent to an independent research firm commissioned by the council. If you want to see a detailed breakdown of the findings from the questionnaires, you can find the

Now that a decision has been made, formal

consultation will be held with individual schools, pre-schools and nurseries over the next few months.

No major changes will be brought in before September 2010.





Charter mark accolade for environmental health

The level of customer service provided by the council's environmental health and office services team has seen it retain its coveted charter mark.

The Cabinet Office award acknowledges the team's commitment to customer services, including: listening to customer needs; acting upon their views; and effectively delivering services.

The charter mark was retained following a re-assessment in lanuary this year.

Assessor David White said the department had made excellent progress in its first year of charter mark.

"The team is excellent in consulting with customers, partners and staff on many different issues."

Council director of environment and neighbourhoods, Stuart Love, said: "The particularly pleasing thing about this charter mark is that it reflects the excellent service being offered to Island residents."

Support for green energy schemes

Three green energy schemes costing almost £40,000 have been supported by the council.

The schemes, project managed by Lightworks Engineering, are at the Brading Centre, Yarmouth harbour office and Shorwell Village Hall.

Cash generated from an energy saving scheme has allowed the Brading Centre to sell power it generates back to the National Grid. Ten solar panels costing £7,988 have been mounted on the roof of the centre and connected to the electricity grid

Surplus electricity generated is sold back to power companies and income credited to the centre. Half the cost of the panels was paid for by the Low Carbon Buildings programme.

At Yarmouth, the harbour commissioners have supplemented their heating system with solar panels costing £20,180

And at Shorwell Village Hall, with the additional assistance of Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Partnership funding, a system has been installed which uses a heat pump to extract low grade heat from the ground to warm the hall. The system cost £10,805.

Each system was supported by a grant of £4,000 from EU Leader+, managed by the Isle of Wight Economic Partnership

part in a series of workshops.

Speakers at the event included the council's director of children's services, Steve Beynon, and Sally Bunday (pictured), the founder of the Hyperactive Children's Support Group – a registered charity which has been successfully helping children with Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and their families for nearly 30 years.

The booklet is designed to make it easier for residents to access council services.

Caring for autistic children

If you feel you can make a difference to the lives of children with autism, the council would like to hear from you.

Earlier this month Share the Care Week took place, a national initiative run by the Shared Care Network (SCN), with the aim of recruiting people to become carers for children with autism.

Such carers are known as Family Link carers, looking after a disabled child on a regular basis, from one evening a week to a weekend every month.

A national report shows that regular short breaks help overcome some of the difficulties faced by children with autism and their families.

The Island's latest Crime Reduction and Environment Week (Crew), held in the West Wight, has been hailed a great success by the council and its partners.

Crew weeks are a well-established initiative in the Island and Hampshire, with the council working with the police and other partners.

They balance enforcement and positive projects such as truancy sweeps and licensing issues and are a chance for the whole community to take part in a number of events.

In the West Wight initiative, council trading standards officers test purchased at nine shops selling alcohol and tobacco in Yarmouth, Freshwater and Totland, and were pleased to find no premises sold age restricted products to under aged people trying to test procedures on behalf of the council.

Along with the test purchasing, ten dogs

were electronically "chipped" during the week in a scheme designed to help people trace their missing pets.

Around 200 people also attended a hard hitting mocked-up crash scene event in central Freshwater (pictured) where emergency crews rescued trapped victims from vehicles and dealt with casualties.

Community support officers from the council were on hand throughout the week with a special trailer parked in Moa Place. Community work was also carried out with young offenders.

Simon Dennis, of the Safer Neighbourhoods Partnership, said: "The Freshwater and Totland Crew has been really successful – particularly the crash scene event which attracted more than 200 residents and had a great impact on the community."

Ryde librarian leads the field



Ryde librarian Selina Smith (pictured) has become the only person in the country to complete an advanced modern apprenticeship in library work.

Selina, 25, undertook her apprenticeship between 2003 and 2006 and was then taken on by the council's library service as a full time library and information assistant based at Ryde.

She was presented with a special certificate to mark her achievement, by Gina Lane, director of Lifelong Learning UK.

Selina originally joined the council's library service as a Saturday assistant at Sandown Library.

Increasing fitness and reducing emissions

While thousands of people use Isle of Wight Council leisure centres to get healthy, the buildings themselves have been shedding tonnes from their carbon footprints.

After a year operating under a new environmentally-friendly regime, The Heights at Sandown has reduced its carbon dioxide emissions by a staggering 60 tonnes and its electrical energy consumption by 13 per cent.

The changes have meant an £11,000 reduction in fuel bills. Measures which have led to

the improvements have included: installing high efficiency electric motors and improving heating and ventilation systems; and new electric control panels and timing clocks.

The cost of installing the new technology has already been offset by the reduction of energy bills in the first year.

Meanwhile a new combined heat and power unit at Medina Leisure Centre, Newport, saved 51 tonnes of carbon dioxide in 2007, the equivalent to a forest of 7,912 mature trees.

Helping our sports stars of the future

The hammer thrower presented medals to six pupils who have qualified for further coaching under the council's Search for a Star programme, which



Some of the world's top athletes could be preparing for the 2012 London Olympics on the Isle of Wight.

Three local sporting amenities have been chosen as potential venues for pregames training sessions.

The London Organising Committee of the Olympic Games and Paralympic Games (Logoc) has selected The Fairway Athletics Centre at Lake, Medina Leisure Centre, Newport, and Cowes as venues recommended to athletes as training or acclimatisation facilities prior to the games.

Fairway was selected as an athletics centre, Medina as an indoor sports centre for basketball and indoor volleyball and Cowes as a vachting and sailing centre.

Council leader David Pugh, also cabinet member for leisure, said: "It speaks volumes for our sporting facilities that three are deemed of a standard suitable for Olympic athletes."

Stuart Quarrie, chief executive of Skandia Cowes Week, said: "This is fantastic news for the Island. The diverse sailing and yacht clubs of Cowes and Gurnard will be able to offer some great facilities, while the waters off Cowes will give visiting competitors a taste of south coast tides and conditions."

The three Island facilities will be incorporated in the official guide for national Olympic committees, subject to them completing a number of steps laid out by the Logoc.

Celebrating hedgelaying



Crowds were out in force for the councilsupported 16th annual Isle of Wight Hedgelaying competition held recently.

The competition was staged in a cauliflower field alongside the main Arreton-Sandown road, with 15 pitches cut and a demonstration pitch by a former national champion. Other attractions included a demonstration of hurdlemaking and an impressive display of billhooks.

The winners were: Paul Davis (open class), Rob Richards (novice class), and Red Hot Solar Panel (team class).

Forensic tag for unsuspecting criminals

An innovative coding system called SmartWater is being introduced on the Island to help crackdown on crime.

Police and the council are bringing in the forensic system, which can be used to catch criminals, identify property and deter

SmartWater is a completely non-hazardous liquid that can be used to mark property or as a spray to shower intruders when they enter premises protected by the system.

Each batch has a unique forensic code tying its use to a specific location or item of property.

Once a suspect has been sprayed, the SmartWater will then show up when checked out using an ultra violet corridor at Newport police station.

So sophisticated is the award-winning system that it can also identify how the suspect has come into contact with the SmartWater. It can last on an offender's skin for weeks and on clothes for even longer. The system is used successfully by 95 per cent of UK police forces and has led to a 100 per cent conviction rate.

Stuart Love, director of environment and neighbourhoods, said: "While we are fortunate to live in one of the safest places in the UK, we nevertheless need to utilise every available means of making sure it stays that way. Not only is SmartWater useful in crime detection, it is also a proven deterrent. SmartWater research shows you are five times less likely to be burgled if your property is protected by the system."

Inspector Mark Bell said: "The success of SmartWater is well known among the criminal fraternity. It is feared by criminals because they know it can be used to catch them long after a crime has been committed."

The police and the council are currently evaluating where SmartWater can best be deployed. Elsewhere in the UK it has been successfully used in homes, businesses, warehouses, offices, factories, schools, colleges and hospitals. It has also proved effective in isolated areas.

Smoke free awards for four businesses

The first four Island businesses to be recognised for going beyond the letter of the law in promoting a smoke free environment have been presented with special plaques.

Gossips Café at Yarmouth, the Leaconfield Hotel at Bonchurch, the Clifton Hotel at Shanklin and engineering firm Pascall at Ryde had their efforts acknowledged at the recent Island Expo event at Cowes Yacht Haven.

The council, Isle of Wight NHS Primary Care Trust and the Isle of Wight Chamber of Commerce, Tourism and Industry, are promoting the scheme to establish the Island as a UK leader in smoke free environments.

to smoke in substantially enclosed public places or workplaces.

Businesses that meet the Smoke Free Award criteria will be eligible to receive an attractive plaque to display on their premises.

Environmental health manager Warren Haynes said: "Island businesses and the public have responded very well to the requirements of the smoke free legislation and compliance levels are very high."

Island firefighters have raised more than £23,000 towards a Wessex Cancer Trust appeal to fund new equipment for Island cancer patients.

The fund raising is part of the Square to Square Challenge, launched last year, in which a team of firefighters will cycle 1,400 miles over 14 days from St Thomas Square, Newport to the Vatican Square in Vatican City.

The challenge was announced in August last year, and ongoing fund raising will take place until the cyclists undertake their trek in September this year.

The aim of the appeal is to raise enough money to buy a thorascope for St Mary's Hospital, Newport, helping Island cancer patients and their families, who might otherwise have to travel to the mainland.



Ryde Esplanade is currently being brightened up under the Unpaid Work scheme, which was previously known as community service.

Groups of individuals who are undergoing punishment and rehabilitation under the scheme have been undertaking projects including painting benches on the esplanade.

The work has been identified and co-ordinated by Ryde town centre managers in partnership with the Probation Service and the council's parks and beaches section.

The project is one of many resulting from a partnership between the Hampshire Probation Service and the council's Environment and Neighbourhoods directorate.

Other projects include the removal of graffiti and the cutting back of undergrowth on public footpaths in areas of the Island where crime and fear of crime are a problem.

Alex Hicks, Safer Neighbourhoods service manager, said: "The use of offenders in this project has fulfilled several important aims of Unpaid Work.

"It has benefited the community, been a punishment because offenders have had to give up their leisure time and it has taught them valuable lessons in being better citizens, such as working in a team to achieve something that others will appreciate.

"It has also introduced the offenders to new skills which could improve their job prospects. It is a fact that offenders in a steady job are at least three times less likely to re-offend than their unemployed counterparts."

The Island currently benefits from an average of 18,700 hours of Unpaid Work a year, 30 per cent of which is carried out in individual placements. Often these offenders have skills that can be utilised to help meet an organisation's specific needs.

Frogspawn advice to fight disease

Island nature enthusiasts are being urged by pond experts

not to move frogspawn around for fear of spreading disease and pests from pond to pond.

Ray Harrington-Vail of the Island's Pond Warden scheme said: "Diseases of amphibians appear to have increased in the last few years, and research is underway involving Froglife and other conservation bodies. We can help stop the spread of disease by not moving creatures and spawn from one body of water to another.

"It is fine to move spawn around within your garden and to place some in an aquarium so you can observe it but don't pass it around your neighbourhood or the rest of the UK.

"Excess spawn should be left for the birds. That's nature's way. Most spawn is not destined to survive."

A special insight into historic

The council is working with the Civic Trust, local businesses and groups to promote Heritage Open Days, which celebrate the nation's architecture and culture.

The open days held over four days each September, this year from 11 to 14 September – give free access to properties that are usually closed to the public or which normally charge for admission.

Nationally, buildings of all ages and styles throw their doors open, from castles to cottages, and thousands of volunteers give their time to share their

knowledge.

Last year 19 organisations across the Island took part in the event, opening a range of venues, and providing guided walks in some areas.

Teams of students (*pictured left*) took part in a special challenge based on television show *The Apprentice* at County Hall, Newport earlier this month.

For the event organised by the Isle of Wight Young Chamber of Commerce, 30 students were split into teams of five and set tasks organised by the council and companies such as Wightlink and Liz Earle.

The council task involved a fictional Italian furniture company looking at setting up a factory in the UK. It had three locations to choose from, one being the Isle of Wight. The teams' challenge was to come up with a presentation within 90 minutes that would sell the Island to the Italian firm's managers and convince them they should set up on the Island.

Council Leader, Councillor David Pugh, said: "Although this was a fictional challenge, it gave young people the chance to learn how important attracting investors to the Island is."

Youngsters have their say at annual event

More than 200 young people attended the popular Wight 2B Heard annual conference at Bembridge recently – a multiagency event managed by the council and Connexions.

The main theme for this year was 'Taking Down Barriers', with topics for discussion including bullying, drug abuse, and the property ladder.

One of the main parts of the conference was to give Island youngsters the chance to question a panel of Island leaders. This year the panel included council leader, Councillor David Pugh, and director of children's services, Steve Beynon.

Among the conference speakers was equality and diversity expert, Trevor Gordon.

Grant help for young people

Youth groups, organisations and promising young sports stars on the Island are being invited to apply for grant help from the Youth Opportunities Fund.

Funds for 2008 become available from 1 April, and it is hoped will help many young people across the Island.

Over the past two years more than 80 projects and almost 3,000 young people have benefited from the council-supported annual funding scheme. Close to £170,000 was handed out in 2007.


The funds are managed and distributed by a panel of young people, and previous grants have helped a wide range of people and groups, from young athletes with training and travel to youth music groups with new equipment.

Some exciting long-term projects have also been supported with the Youth Capital Fund. These include the Freshwater Multi Use Games Area (Muga) and Ventnor Skate Park.

Fund coordinator Matthew Bell said: "The Youth Opportunity and Youth Capital Funds have helped young people on the Island to access new experiences, equipment, training and facilities."

Transition

This is the last edition of One Island that will be sponsored by South Central Connexions.

As from 1 April 2008, the responsibility for delivering the Connexions Service will pass to the local authority.

The Isle of Wight Council has decided to take the service "in-house" and so existing staff will transfer to them on 1 April 2008. We are currently working with the Council and our staff to try and ensure that there is as little disruption as possible.

The Connexions Centre in Newport will remain open, offering all kinds of support for young people - from careers guidance and coaching on job search techniques to placing into training or employment and from pregnancy testing to specialist help in money management. Connexions Personal Advisers will also continue to offer services to young people through the local schools, college and training providers.



The Isle of Wight RON programme

The Isle of Wight Connexions team has been involved in running a new pre-e2e engagement programme, called RON - Real Opportunities Now! The project is funded by the LSC and aims to engage young people who are not in employment, education or training (NEET) in a short programme of confidence building and motivational activities.

The first roll-out of the RON programme ran from 15 - 25 January, and 8 young people took part. The programme was delivered over a two-week period: the first week focused on team building activities to allow the young people to explore their motivations and interests in a fun way, and the second week offered education and training taster sessions.

During the first week the young people had the opportunity to experience mountain biking, climbing and power boating. These activities helped many to improve their confidence and self-esteem, as well as teaching them essential team building skills. During the second week young people were introduced to some of the Island's training providers, and had the opportunity to taste training with the College, IWIGTS, HTP and Smart Training.

Looking ahead to the opening of the UK's first dedicated carnival centre

A NATIONAL MILESTONE will be achieved by the Isle of Wight on 25 April - with the opening of the UK's first dedicated carnival and celebratory arts centre at Ryde.

The Carnival Learning Centre at Westridge has been funded by the Learning and Skills Council (LSC) and Arts Council England, and will be formally opened by The Bahamas Minister of State for Culture, Charles Maynard.

The first users of the speciallydesigned centre will be Junkanoo artists from The Bahamas, who will be conducting workshops and a series of masterclasses (see panel).

Arts development officer Chris Slann said the creation of the centre was the result of much planning and a lot of hard work.

"This will be a phenomenal facility for the Island and will help the Island to be recognised nationally as a centre for carnival excellence.

The centre's creation, at a cost

of £450,000, has been funded externally by the LSC and Arts Council England. It is located at the Isle of Wight Council-owned Westridge Centre, with the council supporting the centre through its adult learning and arts budgets.

Chris said the facilities at the centre provided extensive scope for learning about, and working in, a range of carnival-related activities.

"We are very excited about its potential and what it will provide for many people. The range of opportunities is vast.'

The major part of the new centre is a huge teaching area that will offer many carnival-related courses, taking in all aspects of costume and prop making. This is connected to areas that offer informal teaching, as well as instruction in specialist skills such as metal and woodworking.

There is also a fully-equipped IT suite which can be used by up to 16 people, and will allow the centre to teach a range of creative work.

The centre's staff will have use of the office facilities on the mezzanine floor of the building.

"We are very proud of the reputation we have already established nationally for carnival work on the Island, and are confident the new centre will really build upon this," said Chris.

As well as having strong links with other carnival activities up and down the country, the Island has built international connections with carnivals in Italy, France, and The Bahamas.

Recently a group of 33 people from the Island took part in carnival performances in Nice in the south of France, and Chris and his colleague Frankie Goldspink, the carnival arts development officer, will soon be speaking at conferences in Liverpool, Birmingham and London about the Island's pacesetting carnival work.

Although the new centre is based at Ryde, Chris stresses that its role is to serve the whole Island





Celebrations Bahamas-style

The first users of the Island's new carnival learning centre will be Junkanoo artists from The Bahamas.

Junkanoo is a celebration unique to The Bahamas which features highly colourful hand-made costumes as well as the distinctive music of the islands.

Representatives from the National Junkanoo Museum of The Bahamas recently visited the new centre at Ryde, and an

all-star Junkanoo Troupe will take part in Ryde Arts Parade on Saturday 5 July.

The carnival relationship between the Island and The Bahamas was formally recognised earlier this year when staff from the Island's new centre met The Bahamas' High Commissioner in London,

"The Island has an incredibly strong carnival tradition, and in recent years there has been a series of projects to build upon this tradition. With the new centre we will be better placed than ever to support carnivals and carnivalrelated activities across the Island."

The centre has a special carnival outreach truck to help it provide a service across the Island.

"Although the linking theme of what happens at the centre will be carnivals, the skills that will be learned here and the activities that will take place will have a far wider-reaching positive effect on individuals and groups across the Island," said Chris.

Over recent years, the work carried out by Chris and his colleagues with schools and other groups has shown the benefits that carnival-related skills and learning can have.

"The LSC and Arts Council

England also view the new centre as very much a regional resource and an engine room for carnival work across the south east," said

A major role the centre is set to play over the next few years is towards the cultural aspect of the build-up to the 2012 Olympics at London.

"From when the Beijing Olympics finish this year and right through to 2012, this country will be involved in what is known as the Cultural Olympiad. The LSC and Arts Council England see us as playing a role in this national buildup to the Olympics, and we will also be supporting the 2011 Island Games here on the Isle of Wight.

"These are exciting times for us all, and we hope the Island's new carnival learning centre will play a major part in putting the Isle of Wight on the map," said Chris.

Pitch and putt, Water slide

With spring in the air, many of the council's leisure services are gearing up for some busy months ahead. Here we take a look at what some of the facilities have to offer

OPEN FROM Easter for the summer season, the council's outdoor leisure facilities are offering a wide range of activities for Island residents and visitors to

One of the major activities which people of all ages can take part in is golf. The council offers pitch and putt courses at Sandown and Ryde, both located just a stone's throw from the sea shore and bathing beaches.

At the eastern end of Sandown's seafront, Browns family golf has been a popular venue since it was opened 75 years ago by famous golfers Henry Cotton and Joe Kirkwood. There's a choice of two 12-hole pitch and putt courses, a 15-hole long-shot putting course and 18-hole bantam putting, with different challenges for all the

Browns is rich with local history and is popular with customers attracted by its traditional service and activities.

For a less demanding game with plenty of fun, there is the crazy golf and putting on Shanklin Esplanade and at Sandham

Grounds just along the seafront from Browns.

The nine-hole pitch and putt course in Ryde's Appley Park presents more of a challenge but it's worth taking on for the location itself – a lovely wooded park with panoramic views of the Solent plus Ryde's famous sandy beaches just a short walk away.

Visitors can combine their visit to Browns with some time on the glorious beach nearby or at neighbouring Dinosaur Isle, the UK's first purpose-built dinosaur museum. Its displays of fossils and life-size replicas of some of the dinosaurs that roamed the Earth million of years ago will amaze and fascinate you.

Fun on the water

The picturesque boating lake next to Waterside Pool in Ryde is a great place to take the family out on the water in a swan pedalo or you can paddle your way round the lake in

If the weather lets you down and you want to make a splash, Medina Leisure Centre at Newport has the Island's only public

waterslide - a 25 metre twisting chute taking you right into the largest of the centre's two indoor pools.

The Heights leisure centre at Sandown is another multi-purpose leisure centre with two indoor pools, and Ryde's Waterside Pool on the seafront has a unique retractable roof so when the sun's shining you can have the best of both worlds.

Live entertainment

In the evenings, you can head for Medina Theatre at Newport or Shanklin Theatre, with their varied programmes of entertainment to suit all tastes, from concerts to musicals and live entertainment.

If you want something more lively, The Venue @ Ryde Theatre is the premier venue for live music on the Island, with everything from local bands to international cover groups.

Keeping a close watch on the decisions of the Isle of Wight Council is its scrutiny committee. Here we look at how it carries out its work

"It is vital the council adopts a rigorous and fair system of reviewing its decisions to ensure we maintain the confidence of those who elect us."

ITS TITLE should say it all. Yet many people are still unsure what the precise role of the council's scrutiny committee is.

New legislation introduced by the government in 2000 replaced the old committee structure with alternatives including a cabinet style system that was adopted by the Isle of Wight Council.

Under this system the elected council leader appoints a cabinet of no more than ten councillors, who are responsible for the detailed day-to-day direction of the council's policies and direction.

But how do other councillors check on how the cabinet is performing?

That's where scrutiny comes in. The scrutiny committee can hold decision-makers to account and challenge their performance.

Importantly the committee can also "call in" decisions made by the cabinet.

In practice this means that a temporary halt can be made to the implementation of a decision to enable the committee to raise concerns about its effect on residents or resources. The cabinet may take these concerns into account.

It can also scrutinise how certain partner organisations, such as the Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership, are assisting in the delivery of key services.

To ensure the committee exercises its functions properly its chairman is a member of a political group which is not the majority group on the council.

Other members of the committee comprise members of the council on a politically proportional basis. There are two independent voting co-optees drawn from the Isle of Wight generally. For education matters there are two members representing parent governors with two from the faiths, one from the Roman Catholic diocese and one from

Have you seen any 'mad March hares'- full of the joys of spring? Males vying with each other for mates chase rivals; 'boxing' is usually a female rebuffing an overamorous male!

They have tawny brown fur and black tips to their very long ears and are more likely to be seen in spring when crops are still low. They bound at speed across fields or sit tight to the ground, when from the distance they look like boulders strewn across the countryside.

They do not live in burrows but make depressions called 'forms' in long grass, where they spend most of the day before moving to feed in open ground at night.



Tree buds are swelling and bursting; the white blossom of blackthorn and silky grey willow catkins were out early. The velvety dull black buds of ash open soon after to reveal bunches of purplish anthers. The pollen is wind-borne and fruit – like bunches of keys – will form later in the season.

On bright sunny days skylark song floats high above the countryside. The birds rise almost vertically with rapid wing beats; after reaching a considerable height, they hover for several minutes, mere specks in the sky, declaring their territories in song.

Then they drop back to their nests which are in hollows in the ground lined with grass and leaves. They are at risk from being trampled, so keeping to the paths and having your dog on a lead will help skylarks breed successfully and their exultant song to be heard next year too.

Members of the public are being encouraged to contact the council if they spot any defects in the Island's coastal defences.

The council's centre for the coastal environment at Ventnor is responsible for inspecting and monitoring councilowned coastal defences.

The centre also carries out repairs to

maximise the life of coastal defence structures owned or maintained by the council. These structures include seawalls, railings, revetments, groynes, slipways, navigation aids, steps and breakwaters.

GPS monitoring in Ventnor

The council's coastal management section has been conducting Global Positioning System (GPS) surveys in Ventnor to help accurately monitor ground movement over a long timescale

Fifty permanent around markers were installed around the town in 2003 and accurately surveyed using differential GPS,

which uses satellites to locate a point to an accuracy of about seven millimetres. Repeat surveys were conducted in 2005 and 2006.

So far the surveys have not detected any significant movement of the ground markers over this short period, but further surveys over the coming years and decades may reveal important information.

Seasonal hint for garden wildlife Birds are nesting now,

and bits and pieces left after tidving the garden – moss raked from the lawn or long grass with some dead stems – will be a great help to several species. Mud from the edge of the pond can be used by song thrushes to hold their nests together.
