The Aims, Objectives and Expected Outcomes:

To improve the highway infrastructure by reducing traffic congestion and improving public safety with regard to pedestrian accessibility.

Over recent years traffic flows have grown across the Island, particularly in the Newport area, with the result that journeys times for through traffic have become unreliable, due to the congestion in the central part of the town.

The principal problem that migrates across the town originates from Litten Park Retail Stores and petrol filling station, operated by Marks and Spencer and Morrison's. There is a clear and urgent need for some traffic management improvements on the main highway network to reduce the congestion. Improvements are also required to improve pedestrian access and make such manoeuvres safer.

Evidence Considered During Screening

In January 2012, the Isle of Wight Council consulted with Newport Parish Council and the two local councillors (Julie Jones-Evans and Dawn Cousins) and support was received in writing via email. It is also minuted in the Newport Parish Council Planning and Licensing Committee held on 2nd February 2012.

Further to the support being received, the scheme was then included in the Integrated Transport project, which was approved on 3rd April 2012 under delegated decision powers, by the Cabinet Member for Highways, Transport and Waste as part of the Highways and Transport Capital Programme 2012 – 2013.

On 3rd April 2012, the Isle of Wight Council wrote to the store managers of Morrisons and Marks & Spencers, explaining our proposals and asking for their views. They have both since spoken to Kevin Burton (Group Manager – Network Management and Improvement) on the phone and indicated their support for the scheme.

The scheme has been designed in line with the Department for Transport's Inclusive Mobility guidance and Guidance on the use of Tactile Paving Surfaces, which are designed to help service providers fulfil their statutory obligations under The Equality Act 2010.

The 1988 Road Traffic Act requires Local Highway Authorities to prepare and carry out a programme of measures designed to promote road safety. In addition to deliver this scheme to the standards set out by the Government, it is essential that the following Acts and legislation are adhered to:
