The capital funding allocation for the Accessibility and Road Safety and Traffic Management programmes has been significantly reduced and therefore this document is assessing the impact the removal of a number of schemes within these programmes will have on all equality strands.

 The Accessibility programme includes a range of measures to improve facilities for pedestrians and cyclists in order to aid accessibility to local amenities and services. These include new footways, pedestrian refuges, bus shelter infrastructure, and cycle infrastructure schemes.

The Road Safety and Traffic Management programme includes a programme of measures to improve road safety and traffic management, including accident prevention schemes, safety surfacing, traffic signals, and visibility improvements.

All public highway / Cycleway users

The purpose of this assessment is to provide members with the information that will support their decision on the removal of these schemes due to the cut in the current budget allocation.

All schemes within the Accessibility and Road Safety and Traffic Management Programmes link to all four of the Corporate themes, A thriving Island, A healthy and supportive Island, A safe and well-kept Island and an inspiring Island. They also help the Council to achieve the 6 core objectives of the Local Transport Plan.

As per 1.6 above as well as ensuring the governments national target for the Island to reduce the number of people killed or seriously injured in road accidents by 40% by the end of 2010

The overriding aim of the schemes within these programmes is to both enhance road safety throughout the Island's road network and to make it more accessible to all road users, particularly vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and cyclists which include disabled road users, visually impaired people and children.

Within each scheme, the element of road safety is paramount but each case would be looked at on an individual basis to ensure that no person or group is discriminated against on the basis of their ethnic origin, race, disability, age, religion/belief or sexual orientation where applicable.

Any potential impact following the removal of these schemes will be universal.

All requests for schemes are priority ranked and considered for inclusion at the start of the financial year. All schemes included are detailed in a project initiation document and the projects are managed and delivered by project sponsor (Group Manager – Transport Stategy) However in light of the current economic climate and radical changes to funding from central government all of the approved schemes have had to be reviewed and rationlised against current budget availability.

The reduction in budget to bus infrastructure and bus shelters may have a negative impact upon disabled people. These schemes enable bus infrastructure to be improved by installing kassel kerbs which provide better access for disabled road users. Their purpose is to enable low floor buses which have improved accessibility for the mobility impaired to serve bus stops.

Reducing the number of bus shelters installed may also have a negative impact upon older people as high numbers of bus users are now people 60 years and older due their eligibility for free bus travel. They may be discouraged from using buses if bus infrastructures such as shelters are missing or in poor repair.

Although the reduction in bus infrastructure and shelter money may have an impact upon the elderly and disabled, there is still budget available to make improvements to these areas. The number of improvements however will just be lower than initially anticipated and improvements intended for this year will be deferred to future years.
